

INTRODUCTORY MATTERS

I. Philosophy:

The Aiken County Board of Educat on believes that residents desire the best possible educat on for their children. A positive learning environment is safe, drug free, and without disrupt on. Good student conduct is essent all to the achievement of the school's goals and objectives. This Code of Student Conduct establishes guidelines for students, parents, teachers, and administrators to maintain an appropriate school environment. The provisions in this Code of Student Conduct provide for firm but fair administration of disciplinary measures with an appropriate range of discretion for the application of consequences for behavioral needs, based upon individual assessments of every case, and in compliance with the philosophy set forth below.

Disciplinary act on is best resolved among teacher, student, and parent in a calm, reasonable manner.

However, serious violat ons of the Code must be handled quickly and effect vely by the Administration.

IV. Jurisdict on of Student Conduct:

The provisions of this Code of Student Conduct apply to all school-sponsored act vit es and are likewise fully applicable when students are of campus on feld trips; engaged in, or at ending, athlet c events and other school-related act vit es; while at, or in the immediate vicinity of, school bus stops and while ut lizing school bus transportat on for any purpose; and otherwise coming to or going home from school.

V. Student Conduct Requirements

While under school jurisdict on, students are required to conduct themselves at all t mes in a manner that is in the best interest of the school and community. It is expected that students will:

A. Conform to reasonable standards of speech, conduct, and dress and refrain from vulgar, obscene, and disrespect ul conduct directed toward staf and other students.

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HEARINGS AND APPEALS

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Corporal punishment is not permit ed by the District: Staf members will exercise alternat ve means of discipline that refect respect for the dignity of the individual

intervent ons in lieu of, or in conjunct on with, the cont nuat on of discipline.

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Administrat ve Act ons

Before disciplining a student, the principal, or the principal's designated administrator, will invest gate, gather the facts, and develop a writ en report where necessary. The student will be advised of the alleged violat on of the Code and the proposed consequences, such as restrict on of privileges; work assignment (e.g. such picking up paper, washing desk tops, or sweeping f oors); detent on; in-school suspension; out-of-school suspension; expulsion, or referral to other agencies, and/or Family Court. If the student admits the charges, no further invest gat on is required. If the s

at end any school-related funct on or athlet c events involving Aiken School District students, whether

The administration, or its designee, may conduct a review of data or images displayed or stored in any cell phone or other personal electronic device being used by a student in violation of this code or the cell phone policy JICJ. Any searches conducted pursuant to these provisions will be implemented in a non-discriminatory manner. There is no expectation of privacy regarding live or recorded video images recorded by equipment in the commons areas of any school building or grounds or upon any school bus.

Any lockers, storage, or similar spaces on school premises assigned to, or regularly used by, individual students remain the property of the School District in all respects. Such use by, or availability to, students is a privilege and the schools reserve a right of control and access to such spaces. School commons areas, including but not limited to hallways, cafeterias, and outside grounds and traf c or parking areas are subject to video or photographic surveillance for security purposes.

Conf scat on of Weapons and/or Other Illegal, Dangerous, or Unauthorized Items or Devices

Any weapon, look-a-like weapon, or contraband item found on a student, or on property under the possession or control of the student while on school grounds or at any school-sponsored event, will be conf scated immediately from the student by the appropriate administrator, school personnel, or adult in charge. Thereaf er, if required by law to be turned over to law enforcement authorities, such weapon or contraband item will be surrendered to law enforcement of cials. Some weapons (including all handguns) are mandated by law to be forfeited upon such confiscation and surrendered to law enforcement personnel. Any other item reasonably considered a weapon or inherently dangerous by school administration and confiscated may be held at the discretion of the school administration (with the exception of cell phones) until the end of the then existing school term and turned over to the student's parent after a written request. Other unauthorized devices found in use by a student during instructional time, or otherwise displayed or utilized in a distracting manner may be taken up by a teacher or administrator to be turned over to the student's parent or legal guardian. (THE SCHOOLS CANNOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR LOST OR STOLEN PERSONAL ITEMS BROUGHT TO SCHOOL BY STUDENTS, INCLUDING CELL PHONES.)

Non-Students on Grounds:

The principal is empowered to take appropriate act on against non-students who enter any school building or grounds without permission. Such act on includes the right to request assistance from law enforcement authorities to remove such persons and if necessary to swear out arrest warrants (in consultation with the appropriate school level Assistant Superintendent).

Self-Report ng of Inappropriate/Contraband Items:


A student who unintent onally possesses or finds a prohibited object shall immediately not fy the school staff and surrender the object. A student may approach a school staff member and voluntarily surrender an object prohibited by the Code of Student Conduct without being subjected to discipline so long as the object is one that the student could lawfully possess of school grounds ${\bf u}$

If a student is in possession of an illegal drug and self-reports, school administration will contact law enforcement and administer appropriate consequences in accordance with the Code of Student Conduct.

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ELEMENTARY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

- Students are required to bring writ en documentat on for absences within 5 days from the day they return from an absence.
- The principal shall approve or disapprove absences in excess of 10 (5 for semester classes). A medical note or other documentation will be required after a student accumulates 10 absences (5 for the semester) in order to assist the principal in making that decision. Absences with no documentation are automatically considered unlawful.
- Students who accumulate 3 consecutive unlawful absences or a total of 5 unlawful absences will be considered truant. Parents/guardians and students (12 years and older) will be contacted to develop a writien At endance Intervent on Plan. Failure to part cipate and/or adhere to the plan will result in a referral to the District At endance Of ce and/or Family Court.

Tardiness

Unexcused/Unlawful tardies are considered a violat on of the CSAL (Compulsory School At endance Law) in that instruct on time is missed. Unexcused tardies will be addressed in an At endance Intervent on Plan and may result in a referral to the District At endance Of ice and/or Family Court.

Lawful Tardies In order for a tardy to be excused writ en documentat on must be provided.

LEVEL I -BEHAVIORAL MISCONDUCT

^{**} Students at ending a school on hardship/special permission, may have the special permission status revoked if a student has excessive absences or excessive tardies, which violates the agreement for this status.

Violat ons

- Possession and/or using any tobacco products (electronic cigaret es, vapors, etc.) on the bus
- Throwing objects on or out of the bus
- Refusing to sit in an assigned seat
- Using profanity, abusive language or obscene gestures
- Severe violat on of safety procedures (having head, arms, hands, extended from the bus etc.)
- Defacing property (writing or marking on seats, etc.)
- Disrespect/refusal to obey the bus driver (depending on severity)
- Harassing, threatening, int midating, or physically abusing another person on the bus
- Pushing, tripping, or general horseplay (depending on severity)
- Spraying/use of scented products

Consequences

- 1st referral suspended from the bus up to three days and contact parents
- 2nd referral suspended from the bus for up to f ve days and contact parents
- 3rd referral suspended from the bus for up to ten days and contact parents
- 4th referral suspended from the bus for up to thirty days and parent conference
- 5th referral suspended from the bus for the remainder of the school year and parent conference

Level III - Oriminal Conduct

Criminal Conduct is defined as those activities that result in violence to oneself, another person, or destruct on of property. These actions pose a direct and serious threat to the safety of oneself or others on a school vehicle. Criminal conduct usually requires administrative actions, which could result in the immediate removal of the student from school, the intervent on of law enforcement authorities, and/or action by the Board of Trustees. Level III violations may lead to a student's immediate removal from the bus at the school or bus transportation of ice. Acts of criminal conduct may include, but oul c

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^{*} Transportat on Supervisor must be involved in conference for bus suspensions of 30 days or longer
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event of an accident. Loose items on the seats or foor, or anything which obstructs the aisle, endanger all passengers on the bus.

School district transportat on personnel should use prudent judgment when deciding which band instruments will be allowed on buses. The size of the instrument as well as the physical characterist cs of the student may factor into determining if the instrument can be safely transported on a school bus.

Legal Authority for Discipline in South Carolina:

The Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, Section 59-19-90, outlines the general powers and duties of school trustees and states that the Board of Trustees shall also (3) Promulgate rules prescribing scholastic standards of achievement and standards of conduct and behavior that must be met by all pupils as a condition to the right of such pupils to attend the public schools of such district. See, also, Opinions of the Attorney General, Number 2051, page 134, 1965-66 as to authority of school superintendents to regulate discipline.

Title 59, Chapter 63, Article 3, Discipline (Section 59-63-210, et seq., Code of Laws for South Carolina, 1976). Note: Under authority of state law, certain violations set forth in the Code of Student Conduct may lead to expulsion for the remainder of the school year or even to permanent expulsion.

Section 59-5-65 of the South Carolina Code of Laws, 1976 (as amended) includes power and responsibility of the State Board of Education to prescribe minimum standards of conduct and behavior and to promulgate a uniform system of minimum enforcement of rules of conduct.

State Board of Education Regulations establishing minimum standards of student conduct and disciplinary enforcement procedures (R 43-279).

Kowalski v. Berkeley County Schools, 652 F.3d 565 (4th Cir., 2011)

Student Records Notice: Under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act parents or eligible students have the right to 1) inspect and review a student's educational records; 2) request an amendment to incorrect or misleading records, or records otherwise in violation of a student's privacy rights; 3) consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information (except as allowed without consent by law); and 4) file with the U. Policy IJNDB Use of Technology Resources

Purpose: to establish the basic structure for the use of technology resources in the district. The use of technology to support the curriculum and the instruct onal process must be selected on the basis of its potent al to enhance the direct implementat on of district and state academic achievement standards. Technology must not be used to subst tute for teaching, except when it is used as a delivery medium such as distance learning, web-based educat onal approaches, etc.

Internet acceptable use policy (Internet and other electronic media and on-line connect ons)

Technology is a vital part of educat on and the curriculum of the district and the district's operat ons.



Purpose and scope

This administrative rule is adopted to implement the district's Internet acceptable use policy. While the rule primarily addresses utilization of the Internet and other electronic on-line connection services, it also applies, where appropriate, to the general use of district-owned computer hardware and software.

Acceptable use

The purpose of the district's decision to provide Internet access is to allow an expanded opportunity for education, research and professional development by providing access to unique resources and the opportunity for collaborative work. All use of the Internet must be in support of education and research and

Rules governing use

The following guidelines for acceptable use will be applicable.

- Users are expected to employ appropriate net etiquette: profanity, vulgarity or abusive, inappropriate language is prohibited. Illegal activities are forbidden, including unauthorized access or "hacking" by any users.
- Users are not to reveal their personal address or phone number or that of other individuals, students or colleagues.

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Purpose

To establish the basic structure for promoting the health and welfare of the district's students by maintaining a safe, positive learning environment for students and teaching environment for stafithat is free from harassment, intimidation or bullying.

The board prohibits acts of harassment, int midat on or bullying of a student by another student or students, staf or third part es that interfere with or disrupt a student's ability to learn and the school's responsibility to educate its students in a safe and orderly environment whether in a classroom, on school premises, on a school bus or other school-related vehicle, at an of cial school bus stop, at a school-sponsored act vity or event, whether or not it is held on school premises, or at another program or funct on where the school is responsible for the student.

For purposes of this policy, harassment, int midat on or bullying is defined as a gesture, electronic communication or a writien, verbal, physical or sexual act reasonably perceived to have the effect of either of the following:

- harming a student physically or emot onally or damaging a student's property, or placing a student in reasonable fear of personal harm or property damage
- insult ng or demeaning a student or group of students in such a manner as to cause substant al disrupt on in, or substant al interference with, the orderly operat on of the school

Any student who feels he/she has been subjected to harassment, int midat on or bullying is encouraged to f le a complaint with the principal or his/her designee in accordance with procedures established by the superintendent. Complaints will be invest gated promptly, thoroughly and conf dent ally. All school employees are required to report alleged violat ons of this policy to the principal or his/her designee. Reports by students or employees may be made anonymously, but formal disciplinary act on must not be taken solely on the basis of an anonymous report.

The district prohibits retaliat on or reprisal in any form against a student or employee who has f led a complaint or report of harassment, int midat on or bullying. The district also prohibits any person from falsely accusing another as a means of harassment, int midat on or bullying, and any student or staf member knowingly violat ng this prohibit on will be subject to disciplinary act on as described in this policy.

The board expects students to conduct themselves in an orderly, courteous, dignified and respect ul manner. Students and employees have a responsibility to know and respect the policies, rules and regulat ons of the school and district. Any student or employee who is found to have engaged in the prohibited act ons as outlined in this policy will be subject to disciplinary act on, up to and including expulsion in the case of a student. Individuals may also be referred to law enforcement of cials. The district will take all other appropriate measures reasonably calculated to correct or rect fy the situat on. (Employees engaged in harassment, int midat on or bullying may be disciplined or recommended for terminat on, as provided elsewhere in district policy, for unprofessional or unlawful conduct.)

Students, parents/legal guardians, teachers and staf members should be aware that the district may take disciplinary act ons for conduct init ated and/or created of -campus involving the inappropriate use of the Internet or web-based resources if such conduct poses a threat or substant ally interferes with or disrupts the environment, work and/or discipline of the schools, including discipline for student harassment and bullying.

The superintendent will be responsible for ensuring not ce of this policy is provided to students, staf, parents/legal guardians, volunteers and members of the community including its applicability to all areas of the school environment as outlined in this policy.

The superintendent will also ensure that an age-appropriate process is established for discussing the district policy with students, as with other aspects of the code of conduct currently ut lized during the beginning of each school year.

The superintendent will ensure that informat on regarding this policy is incorporated into the school district's training program and that volunteers who have frequent contact with students are likewise informed of the policy.

Informat on concerning this policy, upon adopt on, will be included in the district's code of student conduct for the next year and will be circulated to all administrators. Immediate informat on will be provided to students by building administrators and to parent groups through reasonable communicat on methods currently ut lized by the various schools.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS:
